

# **Teaching Harmonization for Music Evaluation Day**

## **Why do we believe this skill is important?**

- It teaches the student to concretely apply the knowledge of keys, scales, and chords to their playing through harmonizing a melody.
- It teaches the student to use chord patterns in a creative way.
- It teaches the student world folk songs and common melodies from American history.

## **How does the student demonstrate this skill at MED?**

- The student will play one melody with an accompaniment they have created and practiced before MED.

## **What materials are furnished to help the student prepare their harmonization?**

- The PDF for each level includes:
  - Three melodies between 8 and 24 measures long
  - A sheet of suggested left hand accompaniment patterns
  - Teaching ideas and tips
- The three melodies will be subject to change every 2 years.

## **How should the teacher prepare the student for this skill test?**

- Assist the student in finding a working fingering for each melody.
- Instruct the student how to harmonize each melody with pre-determined chords on the attached lead sheet.

- Determine the best chord inversions or intervals for the student's ease of playing.
- Show the student how to use chord patterns to make the accompaniment more interesting to play and hear.
- The accompaniment patterns included in the MED harmonization materials are just suggestions. Please feel free to use them or any appropriate accompaniment patterns of your own devising.
- Suggested resources for accompaniment patterns include these titles.
  - 100 Left Hand Patterns Every Piano Player Should Know* (Jerald Simon)
  - Creative Chords Keyboard Improvisation Method* (Bradley Sowash)--currently available in 2 levels

**What is the format of the melodies included in each level?**

- Each melody is notated as a lead sheet, with no written left hand part.
- Letter chord symbols are written above the melody, as in popular sheet music.
- Roman numeral chord symbols are written below the melody to help teach the function of each chord in the key.
